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It's an exciting time to be part of the Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peterborough family. As we move towards another great year, it's helpful to look at where we've been and where we'd like to go.

Reflection is a valuable exercise as it allows us to learn from the past and identify areas for improvement. Looking back, my transition in the fall of 2021 brought unexpected challenges that became evident in 2022. But, where there are challenges there are opportunities. Our board, staff, volunteers and supporters served with integrity and diligence. Without the dedication and hard work of so many, it would be impossible to navigate the ever-changing landscape of the non-profit world we have faced over the last several years.

Necessity often sparks innovation. The challenges non-profits were facing in 2022 motivated us to explore new revenue sources. We established a partnership with the Peterborough Petes for new fundraisers, launched a 100x100 donor campaign with small businesses, and generated revenue through our "Big Believers" partnership, displaying signs on our building. We also revived a previous fundraiser, gift wrapping at Lansdowne Place Mall, which received positive engagement from volunteers and supporters. While these efforts didn't completely resolve our funding shortfall, they are proving to be promising revenue streams for our rebound in 2023.

Throughout the process of re-imagining our funding strategies, our core mission of empowering young people through mentoring remained our focus. Through our community and school-based matches, group programs, summer activities, camps and waitlist activities, I am thrilled to report that we were able to serve over 900 children in 2022! We heard inspiring stories of positive life changes resulting from our mentoring work. I received an encouraging email that helps confirm what we already know about the important work we are doing:

I am a retired secondary school teacher and knew several students who were involved in the program and had a Big Brother or Sister. These young people became more self-confident, committed to school and most planned a future that included post-secondary education or training. But, it was the subtle changes, less anger or sadness, more positive thinking and joy that made the future brighter! It is a wonderful organization that deserves our support. - Marilyn T.

It is crucial to keep our focus on the future and learn from the past. As the metaphor suggests, a car windshield is larger than the rear-view mirror for a reason. Therefore, while we honor and learn from our past, our vision remains forward-looking, aiming to impact as many children and youth as possible through the power of mentoring.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all our donors, sponsors, and the dedicated effort of Thomas Jenkins and our board members, for their belief in our work and trust in our ability to fulfill our collective mission. We appreciate the hard work and dedication of our staff team, including Tammy Thompson, Colby Houston, Hilary Morgan, and our placement students, for bringing our vision to life.

As we gaze through the "windshield" of possibilities, we eagerly anticipate celebrating the realization of our thoughtful and collaborative efforts in the coming year.

At Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peterborough, we build thriving communities by empowering lives through mentorship. We work with youth aged 6-18 and match them with a mentor based on mutual experiences and shared interests.

Many young people in our communities face a variety of adversities in their lives, resulting in toxic stress that can negatively impact their development. With the support of a mentor, they can overcome these adversities and develop the confidence needed to reach their full potential.

What are ACEs?

(Adverse Childhood Experiences)

ACES are potentially traumatic events that can occur between 0-17 (CDC., 2019). Without supportive adults, they can lead to toxic stress in a child's body. The more ACEs a child experiences, the more likely they are to suffer from things like heart disease and diabetes, poor academic achievement, and substance abuse later in life. (Center on Developing Disease, Harvard).
